

Rachmaninoff - triplets


Tchaikovsky - cannon! Triumphant

MODERN (LATE 19TH TO 20TH CENTURY)

Modernism: Rhythm, texture, tone

Late 1890s Impressionism: Debussy and Ravel

1900s Expressionism: dissonant

1920-1940 Neoclassicism: Stravinsky

1960-2000 Post-modern: Shostakovich, Bernstein, Gershwin
